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Nineteen ladies gathered in Houston at Mrs. Andrew Brisco's home to organize a new society specifically to keep alive the ideals and heroism of pioneer Texans. Founders Day - Nov 6

In 1891, Betty Eve Ballinger and Hally Ballinger Bryan's patriotic feelings stimulated them to undertake an ambious project to organize a statewide society to honor Texas heroes such as their ancestors.

Miss Betty Ballinger was the granddaughter of Wiiliam H. Jack, a San Jacinto Veteran and prominent statesman of the Republic. Her cousin, Miss Hally Bryan, was the daughter of Honorable Guy M. Bryan, a veteran and president of The Texas Veteran Assoc. at the time. The two women noticed the dwindling membership of The Texas Veteran Association and decided something must be done to perserve the sacred memories of Texas History.

With the support of Mrs. Anson Jones and Mrs. W P Ballinger, they traveled to a conference held in the home of Mrs. Andrew Briscoe, a widow of a San Jacinto patriot. At this conference Miss Ballinger and Miss Bryan endorsed the idea and approved the organization of a body of women who were direct descendants of the men who established the Republic.

A group of 19 women from Galveston, Brazoria Co, and Houston, were assembled on Nov. 6,1891. They consisted of Mesdames Anson Jones, Andrew Briscoe, P.W. Gray, M. Looscan, M.G. Howe, J.M.O. Menard, W.E. Kendall, C.H. Hume, J.J. McKeever, W.R. Robertson, W.P. Ballinger, R.G. Ashe, Ernest Vasmer, and the Misses Betty Ballinger, Hally Bryan, Willie G. Ashe, Mary A. Bryan, Billie Fenn and Emily Perry.

Mrs. Anson Jones was elected president and the rest of the officers and executive committee drew up a constitution and bylaws for the organization that was to be called "Daughters of the Lone Star Republic".

In April 1892, five months and two organized chapters later, the first annual meeting was held on the anniversary of the Battle of San Jacinto during the reunion of the Texas Veterans Association in Lampasses. One of the actions taken at the state meeting was to change the name of the organization to "The Daughters of the Republic of Texas". District VII was hosted by Villa de San Augustin de Laredo Chapter at the La Posado Hotel in historic downtown Laredo. They welcomed everyone with open arms, treating us like family.

During the visit, we learned their rich history shared with us through the enjoyment of guest speakers and were entertained by Martin High School's Mariachi Band.

The guest speakers, Margarita Araiza, Executive Director of the Webb County Heritage Foundation, and Wanda Garner Cash, author of *Pancho Villa*'s *Saddle at the Cadillac Bar*, both shared many interesting facts about the rich history of Laredo.

Margarita Araiza shared how Laredo is very unique among Texas cities because they have seven, as opposed to six, flags flown over their territory. The seventh flag represents the Republic of the Rio Grande, which lasted a brief 10 months from January 7th - November 6th, 1840. States' rights representatives, called Federalists, from the northern Mexican states of Tamaulipas, Coahuila, and Nueva León held a constituitional convention in Laredo to oppose the Centralist government in Mexico City. As a result, Laredo became

the capitol of the Republic of the Rio Grande, but its new leaders were subsequently captured and executed by the Centralists. The former headquarters of the short- lived republic is known today as the Republic of the Rio Grande Museum, which proudly displays the seven flags that have flown over Laredo. The museum is located adjacent to La Posado Hotel

While at La Posado for dinner, Wanda Garner Cash shared from her book, *Pancho Villa*'s *Saddle at the Cadillac Bar*, about the 2000 year flood Laredo experience in 1954 which caused the Rio Grande River to crest at 61.35 ft. This brought the water 15ft above the international bridge, washing it away and devastating Laredo and Nueva Laredo as 100 blocks in both cities were under water and ruined.

With the founding of Laredo, the many faces of the La Posado Hotel which was once the Laredo High School (1886- 1916), to the flood of 1954, there is alot of history to see and experirence in Laredo. - Monica
